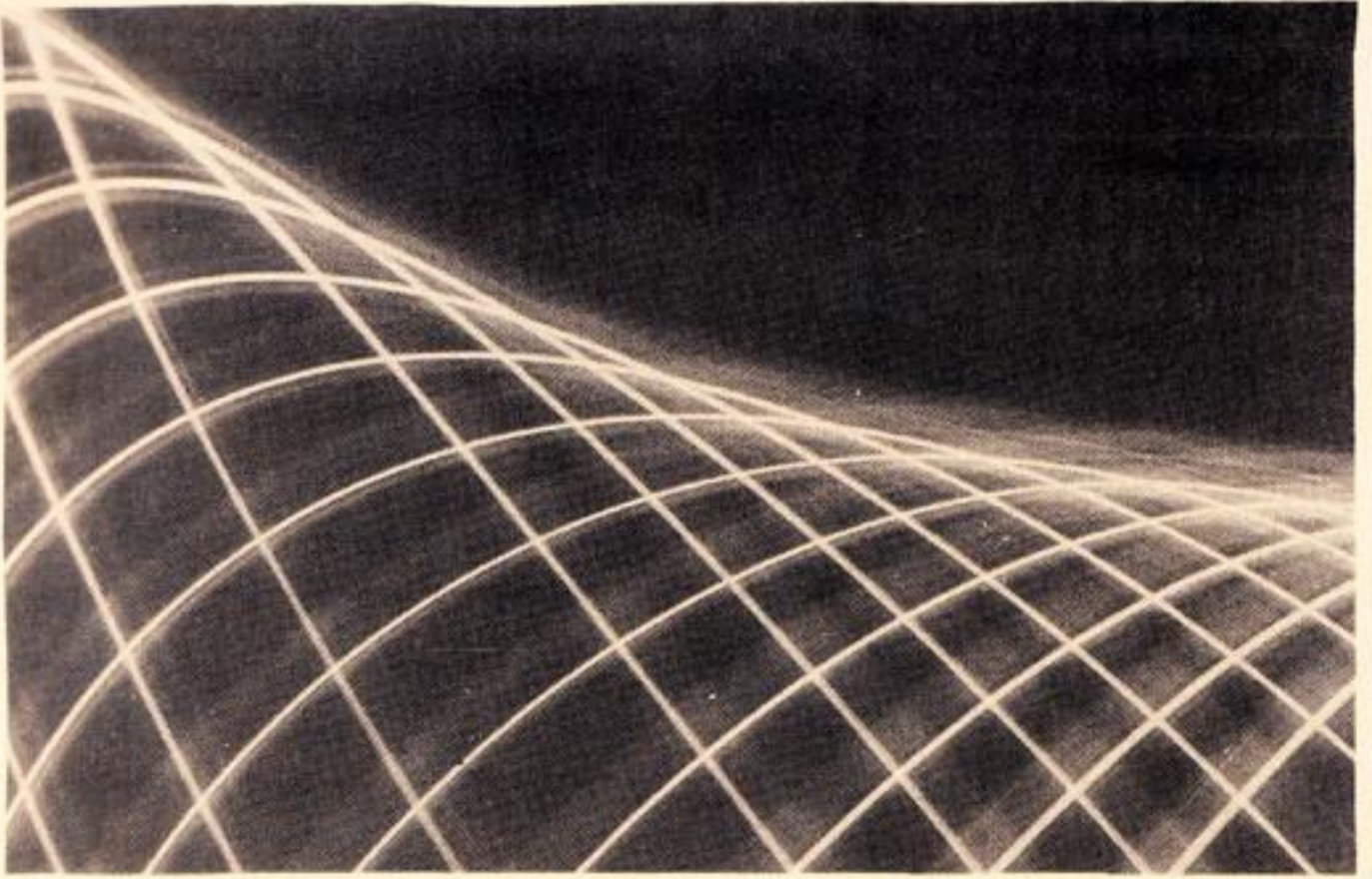
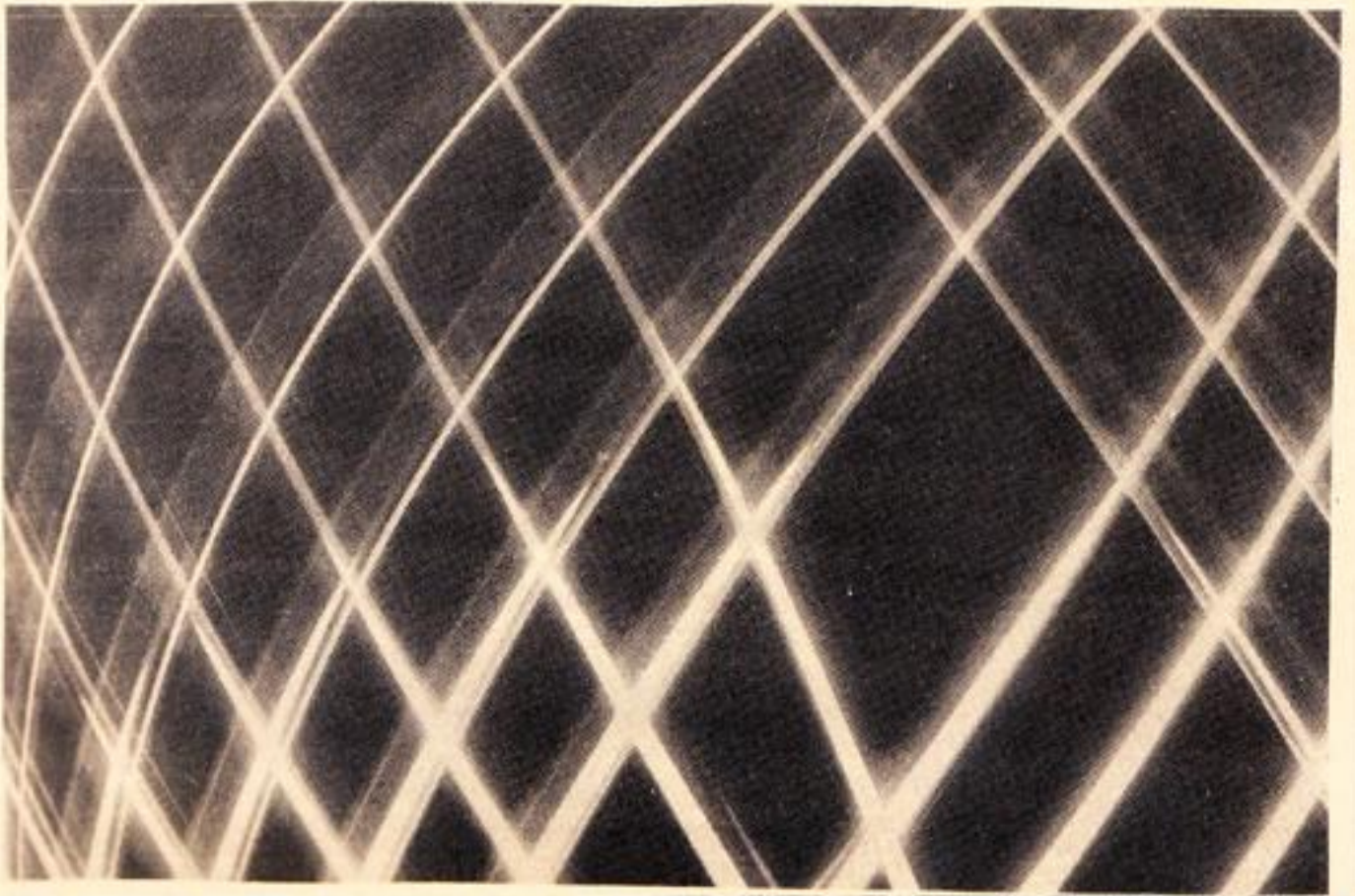

S.R.O. 1980

Soaring through the sky that belongs to me.

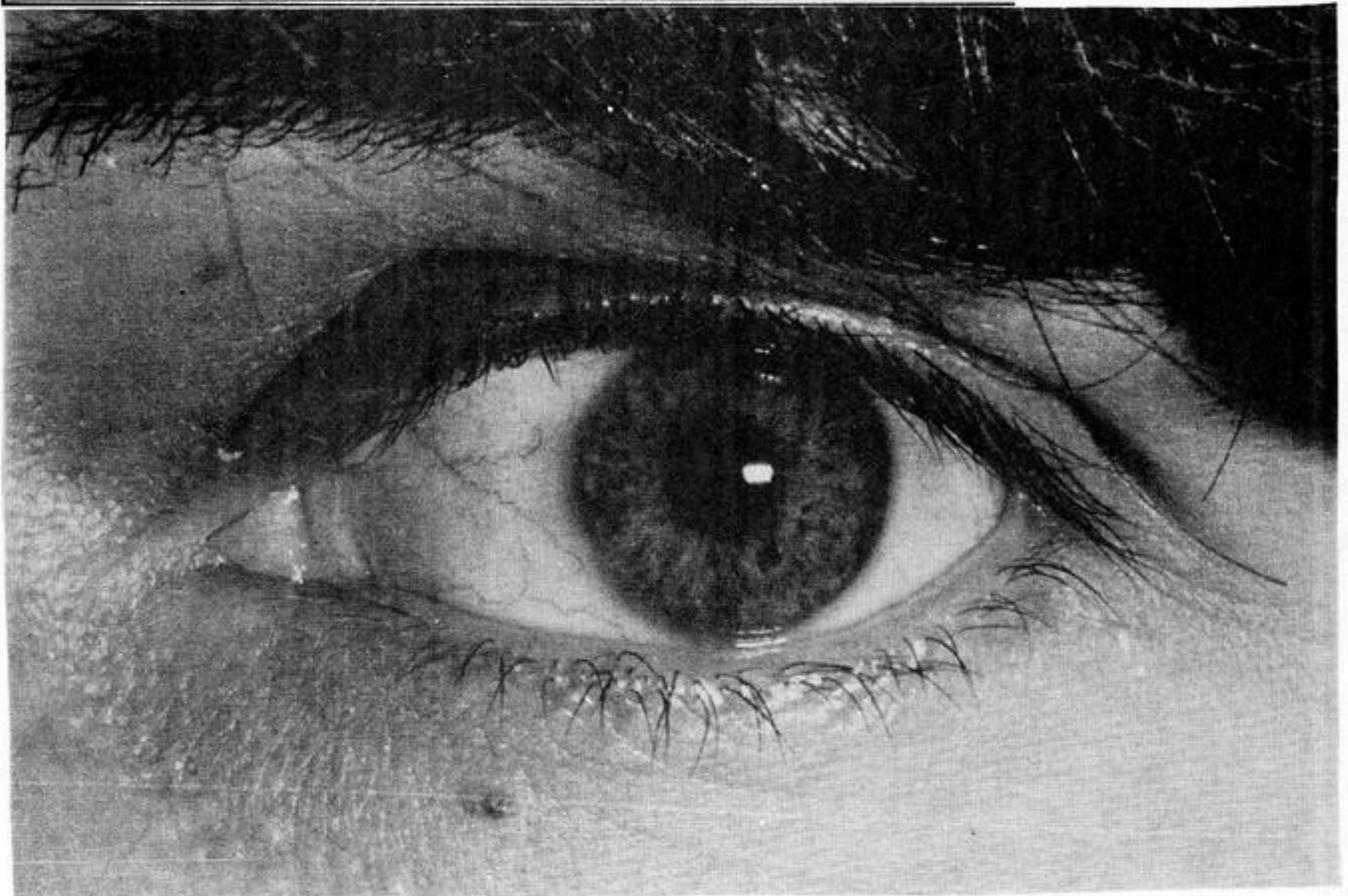
Swooping down to the land below

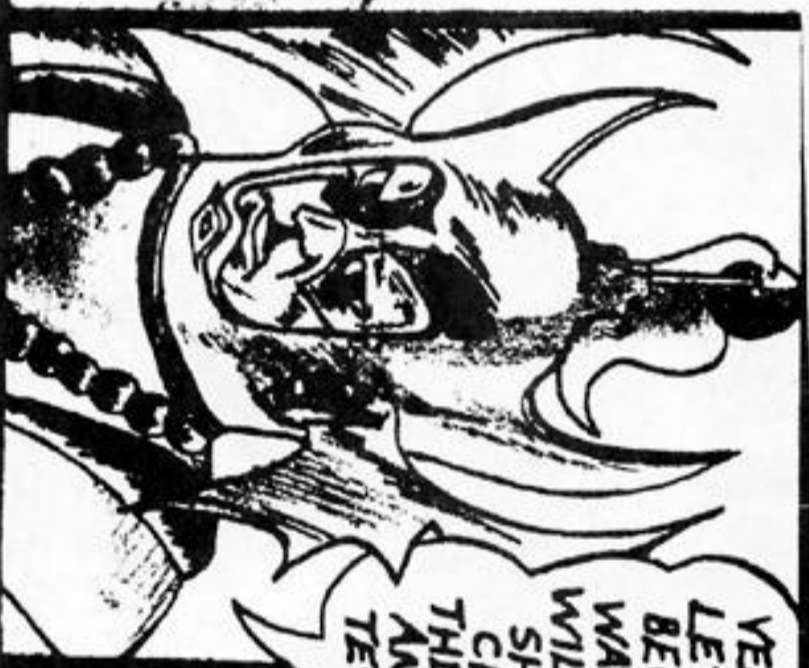

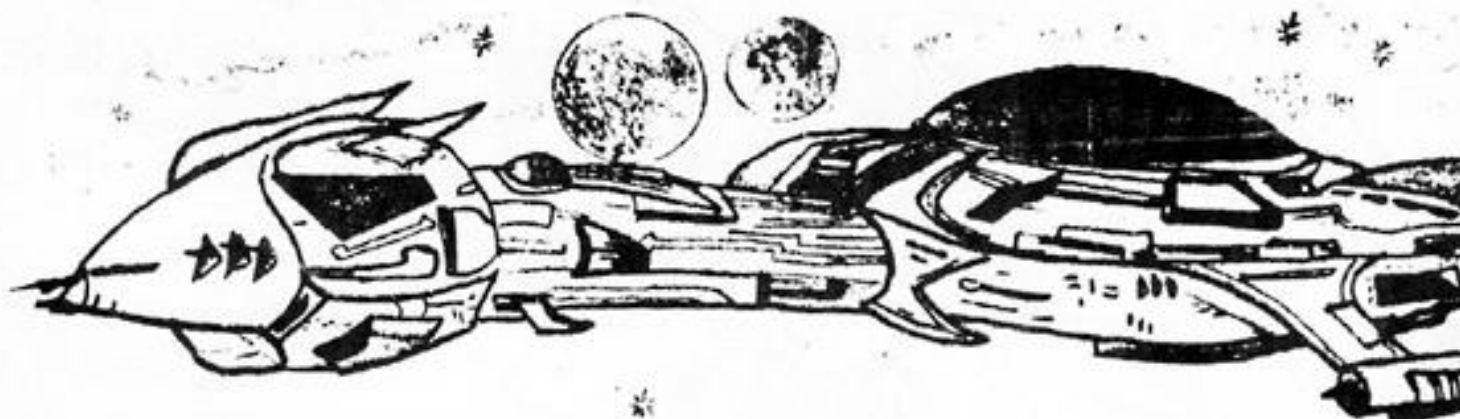

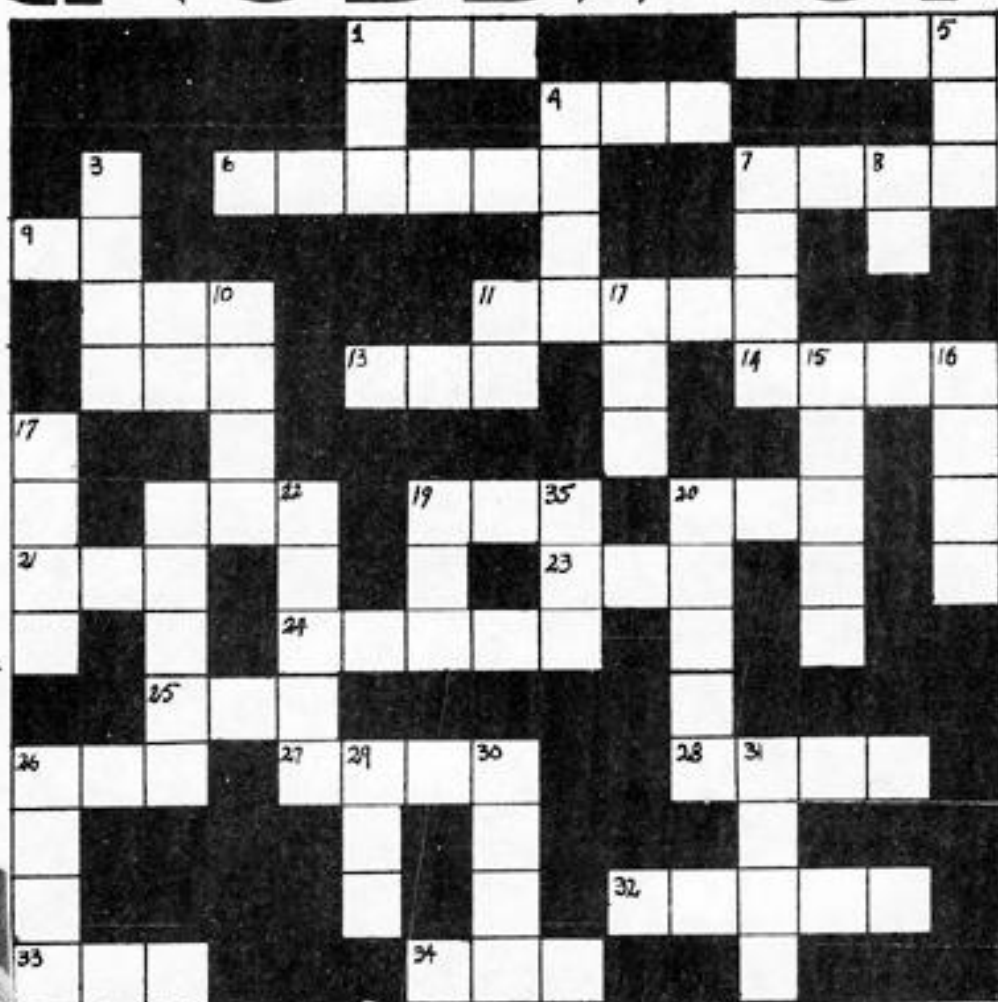
