

In 1969 he moved to Maribyrnong High School and spent three years there teaching in the Science area. Roger spent 1972 at Essendon High School and moved to Braybrook High School in 1973 as a Senior Teacher. He remained at Braybrook until 1978 when he was promoted to the position of Deputy Principal at St Albans High School. He has continued to work at our College as Vice Principal and then Assistant Principal until now.

I have thoroughly enjoyed working as the "other" Assistant Principal with Mr Martin and have greatly appreciated and will miss the support, advice and friendship Roger has offered me over the last six years.

1998 has again been very successful for our College.

We have enjoyed the support of our parents through their participation on the Parents and Friends Committee. Our parents, helped by Mr Tarr, have organised a number of fund raising activities in an effort to raise money to purchase lockers for the Senior School. The

ROGER MARTIN SCIENCE WING

One of the major events of the back to school 50th Anniversary Celebration was the dedication of one the College's science wings to the memory of respected former Assistant Principal, Roger Martin. Roger Martin provided nearly 40 years of service to the students of Victoria after starting his employment with the Department of Education in 1959 as a teacher in training. He taught at schools across the state that included: Manangatang, Footscray, Maribyrnong, Essendon, Braybrook and St Albans. He was a senior biology teacher of distinction who had an enormous interest in current science issues. He was appointed to St Albans High School as Deputy Principal in 1978 and went on to be the school's longest serving principal class officer, retiring in 1998. Roger became a mentor to many staff always offering support and a listening ear. He became a father figure to the many young staff who joined him at St Albans during tumultuous years of the mid and late seventies at the school.

Roger Martin died after a battle with cancer.

The science wing was dedicated to his memory by the Regional Director of Education for the Western Metropolitan Region, Mr Rob Blachford. Speaking to a large audience of Roger's family, friends, colleagues and former students, Mr Blachford spoke of Roger's dedication to students, the education system and his support and leadership for teachers. The Roger Martin Memorial Science Wing will be a lasting memory to the level of his service to the school.
